New Site in Stockton

Next summer we will pilot a halfsummer site in the multicultural city of Stockton, which is surrounded by farmland in the California Central Valley. Our focus will be on the ethnic and religious diversity of the city, and the financial challenges that it faces. During the summer of 2012, the city of Stockton filed for bankruptcy and has an unemployment rate over 20%.

There is a large need for home repairs as well as a shift in the perception of this city. We will be hosted by a long-time SSP church, Central United Methodist Church. Join us in learning more about this multifaceted city during the first three weeks of the summer. There is more information about this new summer location on our website.

Weekend of Service

This fall, we are piloting our Weekend of Service program in South Los Angeles. Youth will learn about the community while completing important construction projects.

We are continuing weekends in Sacramento and Portland, providing opportunities for groups to serve locally and spend time in fellowship. Last year, teenagers constructed community gardens, built walls and floors, and painted. Check the website for dates, or create your own — call the office to discuss details.

Stories from Guatemala *By Allison Kielhold, Staff (pictured above)* The Study and Serve program in Guatemala is a wonderful opportunity to serve as well as learn about the history and culture of another country. Last summer the projects ranged from building a house, to painting, gardening, and making adobe blocks for a future Methodist clinic.

In addition to the work, we visited a weaving cooperation in San Juan La Laguna run by local women, and a non-profit language school that is helping to develop a small rural community. We ate at a non-profit and free trade restaurant in Xela to learn more about the history of the civil war from 1960 to 1996. In Santa Anita we stayed at a free trade coffee plantation run by ex-guerillas. I believe that all of these experiences helped us to have a better understanding of Guatemala's difficult history, as well as the problems that face the country today.
